For example, regular church attendance today means 1-2 times/month; generous givers have more good causes to support than ever before; overall, loyal, committed giving to the church at the regional and national levels continues to decline.

However, these new circumstances present us with a unique opportunity to re-think how we offer meaning, purpose and connection to people – in our neighbourhoods, cities, and beyond into the world – who are looking for meaning beyond traditional faith communities.
